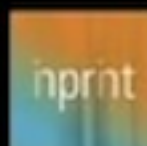
Cristina Rivera Garza is an award-winning author, translator and critic. Her books, originally written in Spanish, have been translated into multiple languages. The recipient of the Roger Caillois Award for Latin American Literature (Paris, 2013) as well as the Anna Seghers International Award in Latin American Literature (Berlin, 2005), she is the only author who has won the International Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz Prize twice, in 2001 for her novel "Nadie me verá llorar" and again in 2009 for her novel "La muerte me da."

In 2020, Rivera Garza was awarded the MacArthur Fellowship, commonly known as the "genius grant." She received her PhD in Latin American history from the University of Houston, where she is currently Distinguished Professor in Hispanic Studies and director of the Creative Writing Program in Spanish.
